Questions to send to other states regarding incorporation by reference requirements:

- 1. Please provide the citation and link to your state's incorporation by reference statute.
- 2. a. Does your state require the use of specific language within the regulatory text to indicate that a document is incorporated by reference (e.g., "ANSI standard X is incorporated by reference and made a part of this regulation" or "the regulant must comply with ANSI standard X")?
 - b. If yes, please provide the required language.
- 3. Does your state allow an agency to incorporate its own documents by reference? For example, Virginia's Department of Transportation writes a Road & Design manual that contains over 700 pages of technical material, mostly illustrations, that it incorporates by reference due to the nature of the material.
- 4. What process must the agency go through to reflect changes to a referenced document (e.g., APA or expedited process)?
- 5. Does your state allow an agency to incorporate by reference prospective changes to a referenced document (e.g., can the agency incorporate "the current edition" of a particular document or must it specify the edition or revision date of the document)?
- 6. Must the agency file copies of documents incorporated by reference with your office?
- 7. Do you have a procedure in place that provides for incorporating by reference documents posted on the Internet? If yes, please share.
- 8. Do you have a different process for incorporating federal regulations versus industry standards?
- 9. If you have found advantages or disadvantages to your state's approach, please share.
